JESUS IS THE GOOD SHEPHERD

Dearly Beloved of the Lord,

This is the Sunday we traditionally call the Good Shepherd Sunday. In the opening chapter of John's Gospel, Jesus is about to leave for Galilee, but before departing he finds Philip and says, 'Follow me.' The very first thing that Philip then does is to find Nathanael, and he says to him: "We have found him of whom Moses and the Law and the prophets wrote, Jesus, son of Joseph, from Nazareth." Nathanael is sceptical: "From Nazareth? Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Philip replies, "Come and see." That summons, "Come and see", is addressed not only to Nathaniel, but also to the reader of the Fourth gospel and to all who would later become followers of Jesus. It is an is my She invitation to discern, among other things, whether the Jesus whom the reader meets in the story that John is telling is in fact the one of whom "Moses and the Law and



the Prophets wrote". Throughout the Old Testament God is repeatedly portrayed metaphorically as a shepherd. This is especially so in the psalms. A good example is in Psalm 23 where we pray: "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want. Fresh and green are the pastures where he gives me repose. Near restful waters he leads me; he revives my soul." We also note the same notion in Psalm 100: "Know that he, the Lord, is God. He made us; we belong to him. We are his people, the sheep of his flock."

However, the text which is undoubtedly the backdrop to today's gospel is chapter 34 of the Prophet Ezekiel. The opening verses read: "The word of the Lord came to me saying, 'Son of man, prophesy against the shepherds of Israel; prophesy and say to them, 'Shepherds, the Lord God says this: Woe to the shepherds of Israel who feed themselves! Should not shepherds feed a flock? You feed on the milk, you clothe yourselves in the wool, you slaughter the fattest sheep, but you do not feed the flock. You have not made the weak sheep strong or cared for the sick ones or bandaged the injured ones. You have not brought back strays or looked for the lost. On the contrary, you have ruled them cruelly and harshly." By way of contrast, Jesus does not just make the weak strong, he feeds and cares for the sick ones. This is the hallmark of the good Shepherd.

Being a shepherd at the time of Jesus was a laborious job. The shepherd watched over his flock, always on the lookout for fresh pasture, and keeping an eye out for predators. At night time the shepherd protected his sheep by leading them into a sheepfold. If there was no gate, the shepherd would sleep lying across the entrance to the sheepfold. He, quite literally, became the gate to the sheepfold. Sometimes several shepherds would share the same sheepfold, even though that meant that the flocks would intermingle. How, in the morning, did they sort out whose sheep were whose? Usually, in the morning, one shepherd stands at some distance from the sheep and begin to call. First one, then another, then four or five animals run towards him until he had counted his whole flock. This image of the shepherd calling his sheep is the background to Jesus calling his disciples his sheep; **they are the** sheep who listen to his voice and follow him. The bad shepherds abandon the sheep as soon as they see a wolf coming.

Truly, the opponents of Jesus in John's gospel, his most vocal and consistent critics, had a very narrow and legalistic understanding of God's kingdom; they wanted to erect restrictive barriers, granting access only to people who observed the Torah and the oral tradition as strictly and rigorously as they did. God's kingdom is for people who are just like us, they thought. They had a very narrowly focused, self-referring perception of God's kingdom. By and large, people with this mind-set cannot contemplate a wider image of a loving and caring God who comes as a dedicated shepherd through and through. Like the hired hand in the gospel, they lack any compassionate relationship with the people they are supposed to be serving.

By way of contrast, the good shepherd knows his own, and they know him. But more than that, he lays down his life for his sheep. That might seem like a highly improbably scenario for us in the 21st Century, but it was not unheard of in Palestine at the time of Jesus, even up until comparatively recent times. Indeed, the fate of the shepherd was very precarious. When the thief and the robber come (and come they do), the faithful shepherd has often to put his life in his hands to defend his flock. There were known instances where the bloke had literally to lay his life down in the contest; where the poor faithful shepherd, instead of fleeing, actually fought some wild beasts until he was hacked to pieces by wild animals employing their shape claws and devouring teeth, thus, dying among the sheep he was defending.

Going back to the Last Supper discourse, Jesus tells his disciples that "A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). True love does not turn inwards to satisfy its own desires; true love is the ability to turn outwards towards others. Our English word "love" has a vast semantic range, but the test of authentic love is sacrifice, and Jesus the good shepherd makes that supreme sacrifice for his sheep. We have here a striking image of salvation. The one who saves is not a mighty warrior who comes in military array, but rather a lowly shepherd. This Shepherd is our only true guide, protector, healer, career and our divine mercy.
